Start early. Show an interest in your children's online life, from a very young age. Chat about their internet use in everyday conversations and help them learn how to stay safe.



See this as an extension of parenting & set boundaries for your child's online world in just the same way as you do in the real world.



Remind children to be careful about information they share with online "friends" they don't know in real life - not everyone is who they say they are.



Find out about and use parental controls.
Personalise the settings to your own family's needs eg. time limits, age restrictions & passwords. Get advice from your service provider.
