We are aware of the high volume of complaints and the much-needed changes necessary to ensure Birmingham schools and services provide the best for ALL its learners. To do this we are introducing some changes to improve the way we do things, and in doing so, provide earlier help to schools and families. Our emphasis is on supporting the workforce and families across four localities – the North, South, East and West.

We are also currently reviewing all of our specialist support and provision to ensure that we have the right support in the right place and that the majority of learners are educated within their local community.

LOCALITY PANELS FOR ACCESSING SPECIALIST SUPPORT AND PROVISION

For the majority of learners with special educational needs and disabilities, their needs can and should be met without an EHCP. In Birmingham, schools and families have needed an Education Health and Care Plan to access specialist services and enhanced provision – including CRISP funding and specialist placements.

We are changing the way we do things and introducing weekly locality panels. Requests for specialist outreach support as well as for placements for specialist provision can now be made through these panels. There are four panels; one each in the North, South, East and West.

SEND LOCALITY TEAMS

We are developing integrated specialist teams of health and education professionals to work in the North, South, East and West of the city. The teams will be made up of educational psychologists, specialist teachers, therapists and parent liaison officers. The teams will support families and schools in the early identification of need, ensuring easy access to specialist help through locality forums. This means that school professionals and families can talk to their specialist team through the local drop-ins.

COMING SOON

The new locality teams will be meeting with each school in January 2020. The meetings will provide an opportunity to problem-solve areas where the school has become stuck and to identify areas which require additional support, in order to ensure that the needs of children are met in their local school. The meetings will also discuss children and young people who may require specialist support and provision and look at ways the team, schools and families can work together to ensure the best possible outcomes for learners.



REVIEWING AND REALIGNING OUR SPECIALIST PROVISION

We want to make sure we are maximising and making the best use of all our resources. In particular we want all our children in Birmingham to be educated as near as possible to their local community. We are currently undertaking a review of our specialist schools, resource bases and the independent schools we commission. We want to ensure we have the right amount of specialist placements and build the links between the different levels of tiered provision to share best practice. In January 2020, we are introducing a special school outreach service to support mainstream schools and to share some of the great practice taking place in Birmingham.

SUPPORTING FAMILIES

We know things aren't working as well as they should be by the number of complaints, the high level of appeals and the high use of our dispute resolution service. Time taken up on dealing with these, as well as assessing children and young people for EHCPs before they can access specialised services is taking our teams away from the really important front line work with schools and families. To build up our working partnerships and ensure families are really involved with the work we are doing to improve our services, we are appointing PARENT LIAISON OFFICERS. There will be a central coordinator and four officers based in the North, South, East and West of the city.

PLACEMENTS FOR RESOURCE BASES AND SPECIAL SCHOOLS

We realise that the way we currently place children and young people in special schools and resource bases is not working. Head teachers, specialist teams, families, and children and young people need time to plan and prepare for a significant change like a change of school. To this end we will be working with all our families and schools towards a September intake for our children and young people. Of course, there will have to be exceptions, but by working in this way it means that the schools and services can undertake the planning for timely transitions for our children and young people. We will be holding meetings with our special schools and resource bases in November and December 2019 and with all our mainstream schools in January 2020 to discuss placements for September 2020.
