

The Erdington Ward is within the parliamentary constituency of Birmingham Erdington.

There has been a village in Erdington since before Saxon times. By 1066 Erdington belonged to the estates of Edwin, Earl of Mercia and many of the familiar thoroughfares we know today were in place. Kingsbury Road and Chester Road were part of an important network of routes that were essential for trade and survival to the village Norman inhabitants.

Erdington is sited approximately four miles from Birmingham city centre to the north, bordering Sutton Coldfield. The area is largely residential, with a thriving retail centre at the High Street and very little in the way of industrial development. Erdington's centre is clearly defined by the land use pattern. Houses surrounding the High Street are predominantly from the Victorian and Edwardian era (c.1860-1915). The High Street itself is very profitable for retailers, with it being partially pedestrianised and containing a shopping centre and two market halls. Erdington High Street has over a million visitors every year.

The ward of Erdington is unique in a number of ways, but two historical elements are of national interest. Rookery House was built c. 1727 for local industrialist Abraham Spooner. 70 years later, William Wilberforce – the politician and philanthropist who was leader of the movement to abolish the slave trade – married Abraham's granddaughter Barbara Spooner and took up residence at Rookery House.

50 years ago, Erdington High Street was home to the nightclub Mothers, which was voted the number one rock venue in the world by Billboard Magazine. The list of bands who have played includes a number of rock and roll legends, such as The Who playing their live opera Tommy for the first time and Pink Floyd recording Ummagumma at Mothers.

Key information

Erdington Ward:

- has a population of approximately 18,603 – making it the 29th most populous ward in the City.
- has a slightly older profile than the rest of the City as a whole and a lower BAME population share.
- is mid ranking (36th) amongst the City's 69 wards for deprivation levels and average income.
- has resident employment rates above the City average and claimant count unemployment proportions are similar to the Birmingham average.
- has a tenure profile of mainly owner occupier, with increasing levels of private rented accommodation, particularly Houses of Multiple Occupation (HMO)

Policy Context


