

Ward Description

Bournbrook & Selly Park Ward is made up of the following neighbourhoods:-

- Bournbrook from the Bristol Road to Raddlebarn Road
- Selly Park from Pebble Mill to Umberslade Road

The Bournbrook & Selly Park Ward is within the parliamentary constituency of Selly Oak and the local **Member of Parliament** is Steve McCabe

The Ward includes the Selly Park and Selly Park Avenues' Conservation Areas and areas of Victorian and Edwardian terraced housing.

Bournbrook was once a popular day trip destination from the city centre and now more known as a popular student district.

The Bourn brook which runs through the area is not the same Bourn that gives Bournville its name. Bourn means stream or small river, but the 2 in such close proximity does cause confusion !

Bournbrook & Selly Park Ward:

- has a population of approximately 19,636 making it the 26th most populous ward in the city;
- has a very high proportion of young adults (18-24) due to the high student population and a lower BAME population share than the city;

Policy Context




