## **BIRMINGHAM WHEELS**

20ha site with potential to be increased to 24ha if further acquisitions are agreed.

Potential to deliver up to 93,000sqm of employment floorspace and up to 3000 jobs

Fast motorway access, a nearby rail station and a new metro line proposed – ideal location for distribution and logistics use.

Successful £17m Levelling Up Fund bid to remediate the site.



## **WASHWOOD HEATH**

Washwood Heath is the site for HS2's central control centre and maintenance depot.

It is located within some of the most deprived areas of the country.

30ha site of which 24ha will be returned by HS2 as employment land.

BCC have a MOU with HS2 to lead on the masterplan work.
