

1. A Bold Prosperous Sutton Reddicap

Priority 1:	To support and encourage inward investment int Reddicap. To maximise jobs and training

Why has this been chosen as a priority?	Statistics show that Reddicap has a higher percentage of unemployed residents than any

2. A Bold Inclusive Sutton Reddicap

Priority 2:	To 'level up' areas of the ward which have suffered from years of insufficient funding and support from Birmingham City Council by addressing long-standing infrastructure maintenance/repairs, tackling issues around social housing, and supporting individual tenants who need targeted help and support.
	To improve the Highways infrastructure (roads, pavements etc) to help residents move more safely and quickly around the ward: too many roads/pavements have been neglected by the City Council and are in a poor condition.
	To convince Birmingham City Council that it needs to sit up and provide more funding to address the issues faced by residents in parts of Falcon Lodge and Mount View (in particular), and that there are areas of deprivation in the ward that have been ignored or forgotten about for too long.
	To correct the long-held and incorrect impression of Birmingham City Council that Sutton Coldfield does not need any targeted support as it is a 'wealth constituency' and does not face the same types of issues seen in other parts of the city.
Why has this been chosen as a priority?	Too many areas of the ward have been left behind by Birmingham City Council which has consistently failed to invest in parts of Falcon Lodge and Mount View in particular over many years leaving many long-standing problems as a consequence
