





86% of those who identify as Black Caribbean in Birmingham hold a UK passport (2% of these hold a UK **and** Americas or Caribbean passport). Additionally, 5% have a Jamaican passport and 8% have no passport.



COUNTRY OF BIRTH

66% of the Black Caribbean community based in Birmingham noted the UK as the country of birth, compared to 62% in 2011.



12,093 people in Birmingham noted Jamaica as their country of birth (6th most common country of birth).

MIGRATION

From 2011 to 2021, around 1,496 Birmingham-based Black Caribbean people migrated to the UK.



This is an decrease when compared with 2001 to 2011 (2,964).

Almost 100% of the Black Caribbean community speak English as their main language. This is compared to 84% of the Birmingham population.






