Closing date for applications: 15 January 2024

Responsibility for applying online

Birmingham City Council's School Admissions and Fair Access Service publishes information on their website, informing parent/carers on how to start their child at school. However, the responsibility for submitting an application online for a child to start reception class, remains solely with parent/carers.

Information about schools includes the home to school distance (cut-off distance) of the last child admitted at the time of offer for entry in September 2023, 2022 and 2021 where applicable. It is not possible to predict cut-off distances for 2024.

There is no guarantee that the same pattern will repeat in 2024, but all parents and carers should please consider all the information below carefully before expressing preferences for Reception class and Year 2-3 transfers.

Reception

- You must apply for a Reception place, even if your child is attending a nursery at that school.
- Your child attending a nursery at a school does not give them priority for a place in reception class, unless stated it is stated in their admissions arrangements. Please see details below.
- Children attending a nursery are not classed as siblings for reception class, unless stated it is stated in their admissions arrangements. Please see details below.
- If you live in Birmingham, you can still apply for a place in another Local Authority, but this must be via the Birmingham online application. Ensure you check the admissions arrangements for non-Birmingham schools with that Local Authority, just in case there are additional forms that you are required to complete and return to the school in addition to completing your online application to Birmingham Local Authority.

Year 2-3

- You only need to apply for place in Year 3 if your child attends Year 2 at the linked Infant school. Please see details below for all Birmingham schools.
- If your child does not attend linked infant school, you are welcome to apply to the junior school, though you should be aware that children attending the infants have overall priority. As such, you are very unlikely to gain a place in the juniors.

• If you live in Birmingham and your child attends a non-Birmingham infant school, which is linked to separate junior school, you must make an online application to Birmingham for a place in Year 3. Ensure you check the admissions arrangements for non-Birmingham schools with that Local Authority, just in case there are additional forms you are required to complete and return to the school, in addition to completing your online application to Birmingham Local Authority.

If there is oversubscription within a category, the governors will give priority to those children living closest to the school determined by the shortest distance. In the event that during the period specified for attendance the mosque has been closed for public worship and has not provided alternative premises, the requirements of these admissions arrangements in relation to attendance will only apply to the period when the mosque or alternative premises have been available for public worship.

4. Children of staff employed at Al-Furqan Primary School for two or more years or who will meet a skills shortage.

For all children of staff this will need to be confirmed by completing section C of the Local Authority's <u>supplementary</u> <u>information form</u> (SIF) and getting it signed by the Head Teacher at the School.

The SIF needs to be returned directly to the school by 15 January 2024.

5. Children who live nearest to the school.

Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons

Applications for Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons will only be considered at the time of the initial application, unless there has been a significant and exceptional change of circumstances within the family since the initial application was submitted. All academies in E-ACT have experience in dealing with children with diverse social and medical needs. All applications must be made on a SIF form and submitted directly to the Academy whilst still applying for a place within the usual timescales for point of entry with Birmingham City Council or follow the in-year admissions process.

In a few very exceptional cases, there are reasons why a child has to go to one specific school. All applications are considered individually but a successful application should include the following:

- Specific recent professional evidence that justifies why only one school can meet a child's individual needs, and/or

The Academy will consider all claimed Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access needs circumstances in line with admissions criteria and inform parents of their decision.

An Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons application will generally not be upheld in cases where more than one school could meet the child's need. In exceptional cases relating to a disability, where more than one school in the area can meet the child's specific needs, a clear and compelling case can be made for the "nearest" school with the relevant facilities, environment or location. You must clearly explain why attendance at the "nearest" school with these facilities is essential.

Evidence relating to the medical or social circumstances of the parent can be considered, but only if this impacts on the child and their need to attend a specific school. Requests may not be considered if long-term mobility issues are cited and you have not applied to your closest school. Please note that the following are unlikely to be considered grounds for exceptional medical/social need(s):

- Speech & language delay

Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons

Applications for Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons will only be considered at the time of the initial application, unless there has been a significant and exceptional change of circumstances within the family since the initial application was submitted. All academies in E-ACT have experience in dealing with children with diverse social and medical needs. All applications must be made on a SIF form and submitted directly to the Academy whilst still applying for a place within the usual timescales for point of entry with Birmingham City Council or follow the in-year admissions process.

In a few very exceptional cases, there are reasons why a child has to go to one specific school. All applications are considered individually but a successful application should include the following:

• Specific recent professional evidence that justifies why only one school can meet a child's individual needs, and/or

• Professional evidence that outlines exceptional family circumstances making clear why only one school can meet the child's needs If the requested school is not the nearest school to the child's home address clear reasons why the nearest school is not appropriate.

For medical cases – a clear explanation of why the child's severity of illness or disability makes attendance at a specific school essential. Evidence should make clear why only one school is appropriate.

The medical circumstances must relate to the child, and parents will be expected to provide supporting evidence from a consultant who is monitoring the child's condition (ie. not solely a General Practitioner (GP) in relation to medical circumstances, or a social worker (or other appropriate professionally qualified person) in relation to social circumstances. All supporting evidence showing why education should be at the preferred school must be submitted at the time of application, when applying for Reception at the usual point of entry. The Academy will consider all claimed Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access needs circumstances in line with admissions criteria and inform parents of their decision.

An Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons application will generally not be upheld in cases where more than one school could meet the child's need. In exceptional cases relating to a disability, where more than one school in the area can meet the child's specific needs, a clear and compelling case can be made for the "nearest" school with the relevant facilities, environment or location. You must clearly explain why attendance at the "nearest" school with these facilities is essential.

Evidence relating to the medical or social circumstances of the parent can be considered, but only if this impacts on the child and their need to attend a specific school. Requests may not be considered if long-term mobility issues are cited and you have not applied to your closest school. Please note that the following are unlikely to be considered grounds for exceptional medical/social need(s):

- Speech & language delay
- Child is awaiting an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP)
- Asthma, diabetes, eczema or allergies
- Car/travel sickness
- The need for a child to stay in friendship groups
- Family attending the same school
- Child care arrangements; and/or short term mobility issues.

If you feel that one of these examples should be considered, you will need to prove how this has a significant impact on your child and why only the Academy you have selected as your first preference can meet your child's exceptional need(s). Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons

Applications for Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons will only be considered at the time of the initial application, unless there has been a significant and exceptional change of circumstances within the family since the initial application was submitted. All academies in E-ACT have experience in dealing with children with diverse social and medical needs. All applications must be made on a SIF form and submitted directly to the Academy whilst still applying for a place within the usual timescales for point of entry with Birmingham City Council or follow the in-year admissions process.

The Academy will consider all claimed Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access needs circumstances in line with admissions criteria and inform parents of their decision.

An Exceptional and Compelling Medical, Psychological, Social or Special Access Reasons application will generally not be upheld in cases where more than one school could meet the child's need. In exceptional cases relating to a disability, where more than one school in the area can meet the child's specific needs, a clear and compelling case can be made for the "nearest" school with the relevant facilities, environment or location. You must clearly explain why attendance at the "nearest" school with these facilities is essential.

Evidence relating to the medical or social circumstances of the parent can be considered, but only if this impacts on the child and their need to attend a specific school. Requests may not be considered if long-term mobility issues are cited and you have not applied to your closest school. Please note that the following are unlikely to be considered grounds for exceptional medical/social need(s):

- Speech & language delay

- Car/travel sickness

DEFINITIONS FOR COMMUNITY SCHOOLS/VOLUNTARY CONTROLLED AND THOSE SCHOOLS THAT HAVE ADOPTED LOCAL AUTHORITY DEFINITIONS

LOOKED AFTER AND PREVIOUSLY LOOKED AFTER CHILDREN

Children who are looked after or immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangement order or special guardianship order. This includes any child / young person who is subject to a Full Care Order, an interim Care Order, accommodated under Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989, is remanded or detained into Local Authority accommodation under Criminal Law or who has been placed for adoption. Birmingham Local Authority's School Admissions and Fair Access Service will obtain names of all children who are looked after or will verify details for those applicants who indicate that their child was previously looked after, within the appropriate age range). Places for these children will be considered in accordance with each school's admission criteria. However, evidence may be requested from carer's whose children are looked after or were previously looked after by another Local Authority.

Children adopted from state care outside of England

Children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted will be given equal first priority in admission arrangements, alongside looked after children (LAC) and children who were previously looked after by English local authorities (PLAC). These children are referred to as internationally adopted previously looked after children – "IAPLAC".

Evidence will be required from the carer confirming that their child meets the above criteria in accordance with the DfE's non-statutory guidance on the admission of IAPLAC. School Admissions and Fair Access Service may be required to check with colleagues from the Birmingham Virtual School about the

acceptability of any evidence provided by the carer of an IAPLAC before considering their child's application under this criterion.

SIBLINGS

Siblings (brothers or sisters) are considered to be those children who live at the same address and either:

- i. have one or both natural parents in common; or
- ii. are related by a parent's marriage; or
- iii. are adopted or fostered by a common parent.

Unrelated children living at the same address, whose parents are living as partners, are also considered to be valid sibling claims.

Children not adopted or fostered, nor related by a parents' marriage, nor with one natural parent in common, who are brought together as a family by a same sex civil partnership and who are living at the same address, are also considered to be valid sibling claims.

Children who attend either a linked infant or junior school, who will still be in attendance at the time of admission, are considered as valid sibling claims.

Children attending a resource base on the same school site are also considered as valid sibling claims.

All siblings must still be attending the preferred school at the time when admission is sought. For example, for the September 2024 intake the sibling must still be attending in September 2024. Children in Year 6 are not classed as meeting the sibling criteria. **Children attending Nursery are not classed as siblings.**

DISTANCE MEASUREMENTS TO SCHOOLS

Distances are calculated on the basis of a straight-line measurement between the applicant's home address and a point decided by the school (the point measured from is included for each Community & Voluntary Controlled School). The Local Authority uses a computerised system, which measures all distances in metres. Ordnance Survey supplies the co-ordinates that are used to plot an applicant's home address and the address of the school.

TIE-BREAKER

In a very small number of cases, in which a school is oversubscribed, it may not be possible to decide between the applications of those pupils who are the final qualifiers for a place, when applying the published admission criteria.

For example, this may occur when children in the same year group live at the same address, or if the distance between the home and school is exactly the same (e.g., a blocks of flats). If there is no other way of separating the application according to the admissions criteria, and to admit both or all of the children would cause the Published Admission Number for the child's year group to be exceeded, the Local Authority will use a computerised system to randomly select the child to be offered the final place.

HOME ADDRESS

A pupil's home address is considered to be a residential property which is the child's only or main residence, and is either;

- Owned by the child's parent(s), or the person with parental responsibility for the child; or
- Leased to or rented by the child's parent(s), or the person with parental responsibility under lease or written rental agreement.

Where parents have shared responsibility for a child, and the child lives with both parents for part of the week, then the main residence will be determined as the address where the child lives the majority of the week. Parents may be requested to supply documentary evidence to satisfy the authority that the child lives at the address put forward by the parents.

If you move address after the final closing date of 15 January 2024, your school application and preference(s) must be considered from the address you were residing at, at the time you submitted your application that you provided proof of address for. However, you must send proof of your new address as soon as you have it so we can ensure any letters are sent to the correct address and that your address can be updated after the offer of places on 16 April 2024 for any waiting lists your child may be eligible to be on.

If a school is offered on the basis of an address, which is subsequently found to be different from a child's normal and permanent home address,

that place will be withdrawn (retracted). The decision to retract an offer of a school place that has been obtained fraudulently is final and will not be reviewed. There is no right to appeal against the decision.

GENERAL INFORMATION

LATE APPLICATIONS

You are encouraged to ensure that your application is received on time (15 January 2024). Late applicants are less likely to be offered a place at any of their preferred schools. Late applications will be processed after the offer of places on 16 April 2024.

CHANGE OF PREFRENCES

You can amend your order of school preferences on your online application between 1 October 2022 and the final closing date of **15 January 2024**. If you amend your order of preferences, or make any changes to your online application, you **MUST** ensure that you re-submit your application, otherwise it will not be processed. **Please note - you will not be able to amend your order of preferences after 15 January 2024, and any changes after that date will be treated as a late change of preferences and will not be processed until after the offer of places on 16 April 2024**.

APPEALS

If your child is not successful in gaining admission into your preferred school, you have the right of appeal against the decision, to refuse your child a place there.

WAITING LISTS

Waiting lists for those children, who did not meet the criteria for their preferred schools for the Reception and Year 2-3 September intakes, will be created 3 weeks following the offer of places on 16 April 2024.

Waiting lists will be managed by School Admissions and Fair Access Service, or by the school itself, please check <u>www.birmingham.gov.uk/schooladmissions</u> after 16 April 2024 for further details.

Waiting lists are kept in strict order, in accordance with each school's oversubscription criteria; waiting lists are not fixed and are subject to change. Late applicants must be slotted onto a waiting list in accordance with the school's oversubscription criteria.

Please note that a child's inclusion on a waiting list is no guarantee that a place will be offered.

All waiting lists will be maintained by the respective school itself from September 2024 and become their In-Year waiting list. The waiting list must be maintained by the school up until 31 December 2024. After this date, they may be disbanded. However, most schools will maintain their In-Year waiting lists up until until the end of the academic year before disbanding them.

Looked after and previously looked after children, and those that meet the Fair Access Protocol, have precedence above any other children on an In-Year waiting list.

DEFERRED ENTRY/SUMMER BORN

By law, parents must ensure that their children are receiving suitable full- time education at the beginning of the term after their 5th birthday.

A child who reaches the age of five during the 2024/2025 summer term would reach compulsory school age in September 2025.

However, it is not possible to accept a place in the Reception Class for September 2024, but defer the child's admission until the beginning of the 2025/2026 academic year, and if a child did not take up their place in a Reception Class in 2024/2025, a separate in-year application would need to be made for the child to enter the school in Year 1.

Alternatively, a parent has the right for their child to be admitted on a part-time basis during the Reception Class year, but not beyond the point that they reach compulsory school age.

In both cases above a school place is held for the child until they take it up.

Parents must notify the school in writing of their intention to delay their child's start date.

CATHOLIC DEFINITION/EVIDENCE OF BAPTISM

A "Baptised Catholic" is one who:

• Has been baptised into full communion (Cf. *Catechism of the Catholic Church,* 837) with the Catholic Church by the Rites of Baptism of one of the various ritual Churches in communion with the See of Rome. Written evidence of this baptism can be obtained by recourse to the Baptismal Registers of the church in which the baptism took place (Cf. *Code of Canon Law,* 877 & 878).

Or

• Has been validly baptised in a separated ecclesial community and subsequently received into full communion with the Catholic Church by the *Rite of Reception of Baptised Christians into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church*. Written evidence of their baptism and reception into full communion with the Catholic Church can be obtained by recourse to the Register of Receptions, or in some cases, a sub-section of the Baptismal Registers of the church in which the *Rite of Reception* took place (Cf. *Rite of Christian Initiation, 399*).

WRITTEN EVIDENCE OF BAPTISM

The Governing bodies of Catholic schools and Boards of Directors of Catholic Academies will require written evidence in the form of a Certificate of Baptism or Certificate of Reception before applications for school places can be considered for categories of "Baptised Catholics". A Certificate of Baptism or Reception is to include: the full name, date of birth, date of Baptism or Reception, and parent(s) name(s). The certificate must also show that it is copied from the records kept by the place of Baptism or Reception.

Those who would have difficulty obtaining written evidence of Catholic Baptism/Reception for a good reason, may still be considered as Baptised Catholics but only after they have been referred to their parish priest who, after consulting the Vicar General, will decide how the question of Baptism/Reception is to be resolved and how written evidence is to be produced in accordance with the law of the Church.

Those who would be considered to have good reason for not obtaining written evidence would include those who cannot contact the place of Baptism/Reception due to persecution or fear, the destruction of the church and the original records, or where Baptism/Reception was administered validly but not in the Parish church where records are kept.

Governors and Boards of Directors may request extra supporting evidence when the written documents that are produced do not clarify the fact that a person was baptised or received into the Catholic Church, (i.e., where the name and address of the Church is not on the certificate or where the name of the Church does not state whether it is a Catholic Church or not.)

SCHOOL UNIFORMS

Governing Bodies are responsible for deciding whether or not pupils should wear a school uniform. Parents should contact individual schools for details of the uniform policy and any sports kits. Generally, school uniforms should be available in high street shops and other retail outlets, rather than from one supplier. Schools should offer arrangements, so that no family feels unable to apply for admission on account of high uniform costs, and details should be available from individual schools.

RELIGION/BELIEF

The law requires all schools without a religious character to provide religious education that fulfils the requirements of a locally agreed syllabus. For Birmingham schools this is the Birmingham Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education. Voluntary Aided Schools with a religious character normally follow a Diocesan syllabus or one agreed by the governing body.

Religious Education (RE) is intended for all pupils. However, parents have the right to withdraw their child from all part of RE. This will need careful thought and discussion and parents are encouraged to discuss with Head Teachers the Religious Education provision in the school.

All schools are also required to have collective worship for all pupils every day. This will follow a pattern agreed by the governors of the school. Collective worship is intended for all pupils. However, parents also have the right to withdraw their child from collective worship.

CONTRIBUTIONS TO SCHOOL FUNDS AND SCHOOL TRIPS

There is no charge or cost related to the admission of a child to a school. Many schools operate a school fund to which they ask parents to contribute small sums. Such donations are entirely voluntary. The money collected in this way is

used to pay for activities or to buy equipment that is not provided from the school budget.

School trips are an important part of school life and can contribute to the ethos of the school. Schools may ask parents for a voluntary contribution towards the cost of a school trip but may not charge for a trip, which takes place in school hours or is part of the National Curriculum. Many schools offer help to those who are unable to afford the cost of school trips. Details are available from individual schools.

UK CROWN SERVANTS AND MILITARY FAMILIES

Birmingham School Admissions will process applications from UK crown servants or UK military families, with evidence from their employers or commanding officers that they are returning to the area ahead of any move.

We will accept any posting or quartering address as a 'home' address in the absence of any actual home address.

Your guide to data protection

The Data Protection Act 2018 gives rights to you, our customers, about how your personal information is obtained and used by Birmingham City Council. The act also places obligations on Birmingham City Council.

This guide informs you of your rights under the Data Protection Act and details how we handle your information.

What information do we hold and how do we obtain it?

Generally, we receive information about you from one or more of the following sources:

- The school your child attends;
- The forms and associated documentation you submit to us;
- Data matching (see below).

For what purpose do we use your information?

We use your information for one of a number of purposes, which are outlined below:

- The information will be used to allocate your child a place at school.
- Section 12 of the Children Act 2004 requires all children's services authorities in England to establish information sharing databases as part of the 'Every Child Matters' agenda and move towards children's trusts arrangements.

Caring for your data

We undertake that we will have in place a level of security appropriate to the nature of the data and the harm that might result from a breach of security. We further undertake that we will:

- Not hold information about you that is excessive in relation to the purpose for which it is processed.
- Keep any information about you accurate and where necessary up to date. To help us to do this, please keep us informed if any of your details change.
- Not keep data processed for any purpose or purposes longer than necessary.
- Process your information in accordance with your rights under the Data Protection Act.

Your rights

You have certain rights under the Data Protection Act in relation to the information we hold about you. These rights are set out below:

Access to personal data: you may request by writing to the address below, details of the information that we hold about you and the purpose(s) for which it is held. We will provide the information in a permanent form, as at the time of the request, subject to any routine processing continuing between that time and the time of response. Your request will be met within 40 days of receiving the request, or, if later, of receipt of any supplementary information needed to establish your relationship with the authority or verify your identity.

You are entitled, by notice in writing to require us to cease (or not to begin) processing personal data on the grounds that it is causing, or is likely to cause substantial damage or distress to you or to another and that damage or distress is, or would be unwarranted.

This does not apply where you have consented to the processing, the processing is necessary for the compliance with a legal obligation, or the processing is necessary to protect your vital interests.

You are entitled, by notice in writing, to require us to stop using information about you for the purposes of direct marketing. Direct marketing means the communication (by whatever means) of any advertising or marketing material, which is directed to you.

You are entitled, by notice in writing, to require us to ensure that no decision taken by or on behalf of us and which significantly affects you is based solely on the automated processing of your information.
