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Please describe the impact to	It is expected that educational attendance may be
the age characteristic	impacted, which is monitored closely by educational
	settings. Students may also be impacted by longer journeys
	if parents require to use public transport to support
	attendance. There is likely to be an impact on families who
	will need to support their children's travel to and from
	educational settings. The Children and Young People's
	Travel Service provides travel assistance for children and
	young people to school or college. 876 students are aged
	16-18 and will be affected by this saving proposal.
	Assistance for this cohort of young people is non-statutory.
	The council's travel assistance policy currently provides for
	assistance to be awarded for young people aged 16-19 in
	line with the statutory offer for children and young people
	aged 5-16. Amending the travel assistance policy and
	reducing service provision will impact the 876 young people
	aged 16-19 in the 24/25 academic year, who are currently
	receiving this non-statutory support, as well as any young
	people who submit new applications for support. There is a
	statutory requirement for students aged 16-19 to be in
	education or training, however, there is not a statutory duty
	for Local Authorities to provide transport support. It is
	parental responsibility to ensure and facilitate attendance.

	Further mitigation is achieved as many parents will continue
	to receive some level of support, albeit considerably
	reduced, by means of Bus Passes or financial support
	towards travel costs above a 3 mile distance criteria. In
	exceptional circumstances, the service will be offering
	support to help to ensure the transition is as smooth as
	possible for all users/cases or bespoke support depending
	on needs.
	The changes to the Policy will still allow a level of support to
	be offered to families of the students who live over 3 miles
	from their place of education to facilitate attendance. It
	would be at the discretion of parents how that support is used. Independent Travel Training will be available to
	students who have been identified as suitable for this

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Please describe the impact to the disability characteristic	Based on the School Census 2022/23, a total of 29,668 pupils are recognised to be receiving SEN Support and 7,607 pupils have a EHC Plan in place in the city. Of these 14,480 are aged 16 to 24 (62%). As at the end of the academic year 22/23, a total of 5,150 children and young people were receiving transport support. Of these, over 95% will have some degree of SEND. 876 students are aged 16-18 and will be affected by this saving proposal. The majority of young people who receive transport support at ages 16-19 do so as a result of their special educational needs and disability (SEND). CYPTS does not currently collect information on disabilities in line with the Equality Act's definition but it is likely that most of the young people have a disability and would therefore fall under this protected characteristic. Pupils who have an EHCP may not have the independence skills to access public transport and may require additional support from parents/carers. As at the end of the academic year 22/23, a total of 5,150 children and young people were receiving transport support. Some children and young people whose arrangements change may be affected. This would likely mainly affect ASD students, but we don't have the number of students with ASD. All students potentially could struggle with a change. The extent to which they are impacted negatively will vary and could depend on how they experience change. It is not possible to entirely mitigate the impact of this saving for all the impacted young people. Families whose children are in the impacted group will have the option to appeal against any decision made. Please describe the impact to the ethnicity and race characteristic	Birmingham's young population is 'superdiverse', with 63% of its 0-25 population being of Black, Asian and Minority Ethnic population, and 37% White ethnicity. The service does support young people with disabilities who are drawn from global majority communities. According to the school census 52% of young people with SEND are drawn from global majority communities. This means that children and young people with a disability from these communities could be affected. CYPTS does not routinely collate this information in a way that is consistent with the EIA categories. The changes would not adversely affect students more greatly based on their ethnicity or race and any impact would affect all students and families equally.
