## **Workplace Employment in Birmingham 2024**

#### Introduction

The latest official workplace based employment figures for 2024 were released by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) in October 2025. The data is taken from the 2024 Business Register and Employment Survey (BRES), which provides workplace based employment data for Birmingham (those who work in the city including in-commuters).

This report sets out the change in overall employment in the city in 2024 with comparisons with other areas. The report also explores the changes in private and public sector employment and which sub-sectors in the local economy have seen the largest increases in employment during 2024.

### **Key Findings**

During 2024 workplace employment in Birmingham increased by 5,500 on the previous year, to stand at 568,500, a 1.0% increase in employment for the year, compared to a 0.5% growth in employment nationally (GB). Birmingham saw the 4th fastest growth in employment in 2024 amongst the 11 GB core cities.

Employment increased in both the private and public sector in 2024. Private sector employment in the city increased by 2,600 (+0.6%) and the public sector workforce locally increased by 2,900 (+2.3%).

#### **Employment in the West Midlands**

Employment growth for the 7 West Midlands Met areas is shown in figure 1 below. Overall employment in the Met area decreased by 5,000 a fall in employment of 0.5%. Employment rose in 2 of the 7 Met areas last year with Birmingham (+5,500) and Wolverhampton (+2,000) seeing the largest increase. Employment fell by 4,500 in both Coventry and Dudley in 2024.

Employment in the wider West Midlands region fell by 8,500 (-0.3%) in 2024 compared to the previous year.

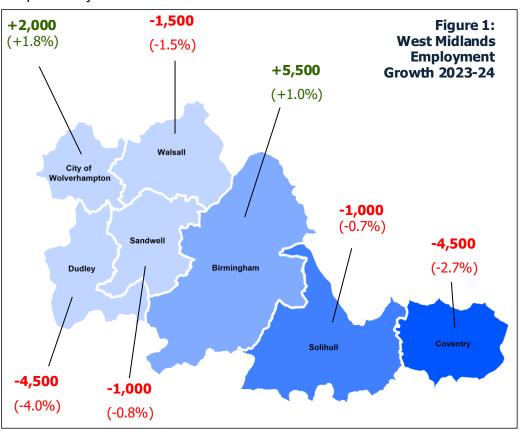

#### **Employment in the Core Cities**

The table below shows the change in employment for the GB core cities and nationally. Birmingham saw the 4th largest growth in employment between 2023 and 2024 amongst the 11 GB core cities. Eight of the core cities saw employment increase last year.

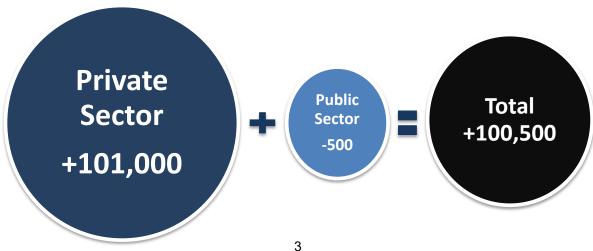
### **Long Term Employment Growth**

Since 2010 Birmingham has seen overall employment grow by 100,500 an increase of 21%.

Within the overall increase in employment in the city over the past 14 years there has been divergence in the performance of the private and public sector. Public sector employment has declined (-500) but the local economy has produced enough private sector employment growth (+101,000) to more than compensate for this.

The changes in employment set out above have seen the proportion of public sector employment in the city decline over the last 14 years from 28% in 2010 to 23% in 2024.

The ONS produce a breakdown of workplace based employment in the city by sub sector which is shown in Table 3 on the next page.

The infographic above shows the major sectors in the local economy, what their employment was in 2024, how this has changed since 2023 and what share of total employment in the city that each sector accounts for.

Public services which includes education, health and social care and government services together (188,500) accounts for a third (33%) of employment in the city. This figure is higher than the public sector employment quoted on page 2 as some public services are provided by private sector employers.

Business, professional & financial services combined employed 148,500 in 2024, accounting for over a quarter (26%) of employment in the city. There was a decrease of

3,000 (-2.0%) for the sector between 2023 and 2024. Within the wider sector, professional & technical saw the largest annual decline (-2,500).

The city still retains a significant manufacturing base with 28,500 people employed in 2024, making up 5% of total employment locally.

Retail trade accounted for 70,000 workers in 2024, 12% of total employment. Hospitality is another large employer, with 41,000 people employed in the city (7%).

Overall, the service sector accounts for 91% of employment in Birmingham with employment of 516,600 in 2024, up by 9,900 (+2.0%) between 2023 and 2024.
