# HOUSING HEALTH & SAFETY RATING SYSTEM HAZARDS IN YOUR HOME: WHY IT MATTERS

#### The Housing Health and Safety Rating System (HHSRS)

HHSRS is a risk-based rating system which helps Birmingham City Council to identify and protect tenants and properties against risks and hazards to health and safety.

It was introduced under the Housing Act 2004 and applies to all residential properties in England and Wales.

The rating system supports us when carrying out inspections, identifying any hazards, and categorising them to decide the level of action required.

#### What is a Hazard?

A hazard is any risk of harm to the health or safety of our tenants, that develops from an issue in the property, building, or surrounding areas. Health and safety include mental health.

The HHSRS helps identify hazards and their likely impact on the health and safety of tenants.

#### **Key Principles of the HHSRS**

Properties should:

- provide a safe and healthy environment for the tenant,
- be designed, built and maintained with non-hazardous materials,
- be free from both unnecessary and avoidable hazards,
- provide satisfactory protection from all potential hazards occurring in the local environment.

#### Birmingham City Council's Responsibilities

The HHSRS refers to hazards that are linked either entirely, or partly, to the building and/or maintenance of the property.

These hazards are typically our responsibility to fix. Hazards can be reported to our repairs and environmental services who will visit your home, assess and rectify the hazard.

#### **Tenant's Responsibilities**

These hazards don't just damage property, they put people's safety at risk. Keeping your home safe is our top priority and you play a vital role.

We urge our tenants to understand their responsibilities of learning about the hazards, remaining alert and if recognised in your home, ensuring they are reported to us as soon as possible.

We expect reasonable household conduct from our tenants, which will help the prevention of hazards. Guidance can be found in your conditions of tenancy, you can view them on our website: **Conditions of Tenancy | Birmingham City Council** 

#### What are the Hazards?

The HHSRS assesses 29 categories of housing hazard.

Each hazard has a scale which will help decide whether the property is rated as having category 1 (serious) or category 2 (other) hazard.

HAZARD TYPE	INFORMATION ABOUT THE HAZARD
1. Damp & Mould Growth	<ul> <li>Light mould staining, minor dampness</li> <li>Chronic mould especially in bedrooms, defecting heating and ventilation or significant leaks</li> <li>Condensation, rising damp, or water ingress</li> </ul>
2. Excess Cold	No heating in winter     Limited heating, drops below 16°C occasionally
3. Excess Heat	<ul> <li>Overheating due to poor ventilation</li> <li>Unventilated top-floor flat in heatwave</li> <li>High indoor temperatures leading to dehydration or heatstroke</li> </ul>
4. Abestos & MMF	Damaged asbestos insulating board panels     Sealed materials containing asbestos
5. Biocides Treatment	Poisonous substances from treatments     Residues from timber treatments
6. Carbon Monoxide & Fuel Combustion Products	<ul> <li>Includes carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxide from faulty appliances</li> <li>Faulty gas boiler emitting CO</li> <li>Minor back-drafting from open fire</li> </ul>
7. Lead	Threats to health from lead ingestion from paint, water pipes, soil and fumes from leaded petrol
8. Radiation	Radon gas exposure     Radon levels above action threshold     Radon above background but below action level
9. Uncombusted Fuel Gas	Risk of explosion or asphyxiation Detectable gas leak in occupied room Slight leak detected and contained
10. Volatile Organic Compounds	Threat to health from a diverse group of organic chemicals including formaldehyde that are gaseous at room temperature
11. Croding & Space	Lack of privacy, insufficient beds, excessive noise     Limited access to amenities like kitchens or bathrooms
12. Entry by Intruders	Security risk broken door locks in high-crime area     Poor-quality locks but secure location
13. Lighting	<ul> <li>Inadequate natural or artificial lighting</li> <li>No lights in kitchen/bathroom</li> <li>Poor natural light in a bedroom</li> </ul>
14. Noise	External or internal noise     Road or neighbour noise
15. Domestic Hygiene, Pests & Refuse	Pest infestation or waste     Infestation of rats or blocked bin store     Minor mouse droppings in kitchen build-up
16. Food Safety	No sink, hob, or food storage
17. Personal Hygiene, Sanitation & Drainage	Includes toilets, bathrooms, waste pipes     No working toilet or bath/shower     Damaged WC seat or minor leaks
18. Water Supply	No water supply or unsafe water     Intermittent supply or lukewarm tap
19. Falls associated with Baths	Falls associated with baths, showers
20. Falls – Level Surfaces	<ul> <li>Falls on floors, yards, patios</li> <li>Broken floorboards or paving</li> <li>Uneven tiles</li> </ul>
21. Falls – Stairs (Between Levels)	Falls on internal stairs     Steep stairs, no handrail, poor lighting     One missing handrail
22. Falls Between Level Falls	Falls from balconies, windows     Unsecure windows
23. Electrical Hazards	Inconvenient socket placement     Exposed live wires or overloaded sockets
24. Fire	No smoke alarms     Battery alarm not working
25. Flames, Hot Surfaces & Materials	Risk of burns from appliances Exposed hot pipes Radiator too hot to touch
26. Collision & Entrapment	<ul> <li>Sharp edges, doors trapping fingers</li> <li>Glass doors without safety glazing</li> <li>Heavy doors closing fast</li> </ul>
27. Explosions	From gas leaks or aerosols     Poorly maintained gas supply
28. Position & Operability of Inaccessible Amenities	Poorly placed controls Boiler controls out of reach     Wall cabinet too high
29. Structural Collapse & Falling Elements	Risk from unstable buildings Loose roof tiles, unstable wall components Loose fence panel in garden

## QUICK GUIDE FOR REDUCING RISKS OF HAZARDS IN YOUR HOME

- Always allow access to our officers/contractors to your property. They have the expertise to identify hazards, and complete important safety checks.
- Never store or use portable oil, paraffin or gas cylinder heaters in your home.
- Ensure air vents and extractors are clear.
- Avoid smoking indoors, check lit flames are put out, check smoke alarm is working regularly.
- Report any suspicions of asbestos immediately; do not to disturb any materials potentially containing asbestos.
- Open windows and ventilate regularly, dry clothes outdoors where possible, use dehumidifiers.
- Maintain good personal and home hygiene, seal gaps in walls and floors, store food securely, empty bins regularly at designated refuse site.
- Avoid overloading plug sockets, report flickering lights or burnt smells.
- Lock doors and window, test alarm systems regularly, report faulty locks.
- Reduce clutter and remove obstacles around property and stairs, install handrail on stairs.
- Check and change bulbs as needed, consider using energy-efficient bulbs, fit exterior lights.
- Check that taps, pipes, and water storage tanks are all in good condition.
- If in doubt, contact your local housing officer for advice.
