Claimant Count Unemployment Monthly Update – October 2025 Data

Please Note: Recent changes to Universal Credit (UC) including a further transition of some claimants on legacy benefits and an increase in the Administrative Earnings Threshold has resulted in many more UC claimants being moved into the 'Intensive Work Search' category and thus being counted in the claimant count figures. Total Claimant Count

In October 2025, unadjusted claimant count numbers in the city increased by 1,250 to 78,220. The unadjusted claimant rate (% of the economically active population) increased to 14.0%, with the claimant proportion (% of the whole working age population) also increasing to 10.3%. Claimant numbers also increased in the WMCA (Met area) and the UK last month.

Youth Claimant Count

In Birmingham, the unadjusted youth (18-24) claimant count increased by 530 in October to 15,650. The unadjusted youth unemployment rate increased to 18.4%, with the youth claimant proportion also increasing to 11.4%. Unadjusted youth unemployment increased in the WMCA (14.8%) and for the UK as a whole (8.9%) in October.

Core Cities

Table 1 below shows the unadjusted claimant count unemployment data for October 2025 for the core cities. Birmingham has the highest claimant unemployment rate (14.0%) amongst the core cities and is well above the UK average (4.9%). Eleven of the twelve core cities saw claimant numbers increase last month.

West Midlands Region

Table 2 displays the latest claimant count data for the region. Birmingham along with Wolverhampton and Sandwell, have the highest unemployment rates locally, with Coventry, Dudley and Solihull having lower rates, closer to or below the UK average. All of the seven Met areas saw an increase in unemployment in October, as did the West Midlands region.

Birmingham Constituencies


Table 3 below shows the unadjusted claimant count unemployment data for October 2025 for the 10 parliamentary constituencies in the city. Perry Barr constituency has the highest claimant count unemployment rate at 29.1% and Sutton Coldfield the lowest at 2.6%. All of the ten constituencies saw an increase in claimant numbers last month. The largest increase in claimant count numbers in October occurred in Ladywood (+380).

Birmingham Claimant Concentration

The infographic below highlights the concentration of claimants in the city by showing what percentage of claimants in wider areas are accounted for by Birmingham claimants. 31% of all claimants in the UK core city are in Birmingham and the city accounts for over half (54%) of claimants in the WMCA area.



Birmingham Wards

containing ward claimant count unemployment data and ward youth unemployment data are shown on the following pages.

Lozells (22.3%) and Handsworth(21.0%) wards have the highest claimant proportions. The Sutton wards (Sutton Reddicap aside) have the lowest claimant proportions, all 3.1% or under.

55 of the 69 wards in the city saw unemployment increase last month. The largest increase in total claimant numbers at a ward level occurred in Alum Rock (+85) and Balsall Heath West (+70).

In terms of ward youth unemployment Tyseley & Hay Mills (22.7%) and Birchfield (21.6%) have the highest youth claimant proportions.

46 of the city's wards saw youth claimant numbers increase last month.

The map below highlights that the highest levels of claimant unemployment are concentrated in the inner city. East Birmingham accounts for 34% of all claimant unemployment in the city and 18% of unemployment in the WMCA.



Latest Resident Employment



The latest Annual Population Survey employment data for Birmingham (Q2 2025) shows working age employment levels increasing by 1,900 in the last quarter to stand at 508,900. The employment rate increased rising from 67.2% in Q1 to 67.4% in Q2 2025.

Economic inactivity (those not in work or seeking work) in the city stood at 202,500 in Q2, 26.8% of the 16-64 population.

The latest Labour Force Survey figures for the West Midlands region for the three month period July to September 2025 shows that the number of working age people employed has increased by 10,100 compared with the previous quarter (April to June). The employment rate regionally increased by 0.1% point compared to the previous quarter to stand at 73.7%.

Nationally the employment rate fell by 0.3% points to 75.0%. The employment rate nationally is still below pre pandemic levels.

Vacancies

The latest data on online job adverts from the ONS/Textkernel shows that in September 2025 there were 15,715 new online job adverts posted in Birmingham. This was up by 1,009 (+6.9%) on the previous month.

The occupations that had the highest number of new online adverts in Birmingham in September 2025 were sales & marketing professionals (937), IT professionals (838) and teachers (549).

Skill Levels

On the supply side comparatively high unemployment and low employment rates in the city are linked to the skills gap that exists locally with residents having lower skills and qualification levels than the national average.

The chart below highlights this showing how Birmingham (11.6%) has a greater proportion of working age residents with no qualifications compared to the UK (6.8%) and the core city average (8.6%).

The city (64.6%) also has a correspondingly lower proportion of residents with RQF3+ qualifications than the UK (67.8%) and core city average (68.9%).
