Admission Arrangements for the academic year 2027/2028



St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School is part of Lumen Christi Catholic Multi Academy. The admissions authority for the school is the Board of Directors of Lumen Christi Catholic Multi Academy who has responsibility for admissions to this school. The Board of Directors has delegated responsibility for the administration of the admissions process to the School Standards Committee of St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School.

The admissions process for St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School is part of the Birmingham Local Authority co-ordinated admissions scheme. To apply for a place at St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School in the normal admissions round, an application must be made using the school admission application process of the local authority in which you live naming St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School on the application form. Applications need to be made by 31st October 2026. A Supplementary Information Form (SIF) must also be completed and returned directly to the school by the same date (see Note 2).

All applications which are submitted on time will be considered at the same time, after the closing date.

You will be advised of the outcome of your application on 1st March 2027, or the next working day, by the local authority on behalf of the school.

Please note that throughout this policy, the term parent means all natural parents, any person who is not a parent but has parental responsibility for a child and any person who has care of a child.

The ethos of this school is Catholic. The school was founded by the Catholic Church to provide education for children of Catholic families. Whenever there are more applications than places available, priority will be given to Catholic children in accordance with the oversubscription criteria listed below. The school is conducted by its Board of Directors as part of the Catholic Church in accordance with its Articles of Association and seeks at all times to be a witness to Our Lord Jesus Christ.

As a Catholic school, we aim to provide a Catholic education for all our pupils. At a Catholic school, Catholic doctrine and practice permeate every aspect of the school's activity. It is essential that the Catholic character of the school's education be fully supported by all families in the school. We therefore hope that all parents will give their full, unreserved and positive support for the aims and ethos of the school. This does not affect the right of an applicant who is not Catholic to apply for and be admitted to a place at the school in accordance with these admission arrangements.

The School Standards Committee acts for the Board of Directors who is the admissions authority and has responsibility for admissions to this school. The School Standards Committee has set its Published Admission Number ("PAN") at 210 pupils to be admitted to Year 7 in the school year which begins in September 2027. (See Note 1 below)

Where there are more applications for places than the number of places available, places will be offered according to the following order of priority. If there is oversubscription within a category, the School Standards Committee will give priority firstly to children who will have a brother or sister (see Note 4 below)

attending St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School at the time of admission and then secondly to children living closest to the school determined by the shortest distance (see Note 6 below).

For the purposes of this policy, parish boundaries are as shown on the Archdiocese of Birmingham parish boundary map which can be accessed at https://www.birminghamdiocese.org.uk/boundary-map and will be applied to the admission arrangements for the academic year 2027/2028.

Oversubscription Criteria for Years 7 - 11

- 1. Baptised Catholic children (see Note 2 below) who are looked after or previously looked after (See Note 3 below).
- 2. Baptised Catholic children (see Note 2 below) of a member of staff working for St Thomas Aquinas Catholic School (see Note 8 below).
- 3. Baptised Catholic children (see Note 2 below) currently attending a Lumen Christi School (see Note 5 below).
- 4. Baptised Catholic children (see Note 2 below) currently attending a named feeder school (see Note 6 below).
- 5. Other Baptised Catholic children (see note 2 below).
- 6. Non-Catholic children who are looked after or previously looked after (See Note 3 below)
- 7. Non-Catholic children of a member of staff working for St Thomas Aquinas Catholic School (see Note 8 below).
- 8. Non-Catholic children currently attending a Lumen Christi School (see Note 5 below).
- 9. Non-Catholic children currently attending a named feeder school (see Note 6 below).
- 10. Other Non-Catholic children.

Note 1

The admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care Plan is dealt with by a completely separate procedure. Children with an Education, Health and Care Plan that names the school must be admitted. Where this takes place before the allocation of places under these arrangements this will reduce the number of places available to other children.

An Education, Health and Care Plan is a plan made by the local authority under section 37 of the Children and Families Act 2014, specifying the special educational provision required for a child.

Note 2

In all categories, for a child to be considered as Catholic, evidence of Catholic Baptism or Reception into the Church will be required. For a definition of a Baptised Catholic, see the Appendix. Those who face difficulties in producing written evidence of Catholic Baptism or Reception into the Church should contact their Parish Priest.

Parents making an application for a Catholic child should also complete a Supplementary Information Form (SIF) which should be returned directly to the school. If you do not provide the information required in the Supplementary Information Form and return it by the closing date, together with all supporting documentation, this may affect the criteria that your child is placed into, which may affect your child's chance of being offered a place at this school.

For the purposes of this policy, a looked after child living with a family where at least one of the carers is Catholic will be considered as Catholic. The carer must forward a copy of their own Catholic Baptismal or Reception certificate directly to the school in order for this priority to be given to the child as failure to do so will result in the looked after child being ranked as a non-Catholic.

Note 3

A "looked after child" has the same meaning as in section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989, and means any child who is (a) in the care of the local authority or (b) being provided with accommodation by them in the exercise of their social services functions (e.g. children with foster parents) at the time of making the application to the school. A "previously looked after child" is a child who was looked after, but ceased to be so because he or she was adopted or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order and includes those children who appear to the School Standards Committee to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state case as a result of being adopted. For the purposes of this policy, a looked after child living with a family where at least one of the carers is Catholic will be considered as Catholic. The carer must forward a copy of their own Catholic Baptismal or Reception certificate directly to the school in order for this priority to be given to the child as failure to do

Note 4

For all applicants the definition of a brother or sister is:

so will result in the looked after child being ranked as a non-Catholic.

- A brother or sister sharing the same parents
- A half-brother or half-sister, where two children share one common parent
- A step-brother or step-sister, where two children are related by a parents' marriage or civil partnership, or where they are unrelated but their parents are living as partners.
- Adopted or fostered children

At the time of consultation on this policy, Lumen Christi Catholic Multi Academy Primary Schools are:

This may change as more schools join the academy therefore this criterion may be expanded to include schools who are legally a member of Lumen Christi Catholic Multi Academy on 31st October 2026.

The named feeder schools for St Thomas Aquinas Catholic School are:

- Our Lady & St. Rose of Lima Catholic Primary School, Weoley Castle
- St Edward's Catholic Primary School, Selly Park

Note 7

Distances are calculated on the basis of a straight-line measurement between the child's home address and St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School. The Local Authority uses a computerised system, which measures all distances in metres. Ordnance Survey supplies the co-ordinates that are used to plot a child's home address and the address of the school.

In a very small number of cases, where the school is oversubscribed, it may not be possible to decide between the applications of those pupils who are the final qualifiers for a place when applying the published admission criteria.

For example, this may occur when children in the same year group live at the same address, or if the distance between the home and the school is exactly the same, for example, blocks of flats. If there is no other way of separating the application according to the admissions criteria and to admit both, or all, of the children would cause the Published Admission Number for the child's year group to be exceeded, the Local Authority, on behalf of the School Standards Committee, will use a computerised system to randomly select the child to be offered the final place.

The School Standards Committee will, where logistically possible, admit twins and all siblings from multiple births where one of the children is the last child ranked within the school's published admission number.

A child's home address refers to the address where the child usually lives with a parent or carer and will be the address provided in the Local Authority's Common Application Form.

Where parents have shared responsibility for a child, and the child lives for part of the week with each parent, the home address will be the address provided in the Local Authority's Common Application Form, provided that the child resides at that address for any part of the school week.

Parents may be requested to supply documentary evidence to satisfy the School Standards Committee that the child lives at the address put forward by the parents.

Note 8

For the purpose of this policy, a 'member of staff' is defined as an individual who has been employed by St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School for two or more years prior to the local authority Common Application Form submission deadline for the relevant admission round, or where the staff member has recently been recruited to fill a vacant post where the is a demonstrable skill shortage.

The School Standards Committee reserves the right to withdraw the offer of a place or, where a child is already attending the school the place itself, where it is satisfied that the offer or place was obtained by deception.

APPLICATIONS FOR CHILDREN TO BE ADMITTED INTO A CLASS OUTSIDE OF THEIR NORMAL AGE GROUP

Parents have the right to request, but not insist, that their child be considered for admission to a class outside of their normal age group. This could be the case, for example, if a child is gifted and talented, has experienced problems such as ill health, or is already being educated in a class outside of their normal age group at their current Primary school. Parents who wish for their child to be considered for admission to a class outside of their normal age group must make an application for the normal age group in the first instance. Parents must then submit a formal request to the School Standards Committee for the child to be considered for a different age group class instead. This request should be in the form of a written letter of application outlining the reasons why they wish for their child to be considered to be admitted into a class outside of their normal age group and enclosing any supportive evidence and documentation that they wish to be taken into account as part of that request.

The School Standards Committee will consider requests submitted for a child to be admitted into a class outside of their normal age group and advise parents of the outcome of that request before national offer day, having taken into account the information provided by the parents, the child's best interests and the views of the Head Teacher.

If the request is refused, the original application for the normal age group class will progress through the Local Authority co-ordinated admissions scheme, be considered by the School Standards Committee and the parents advised of the outcome.

If the request is agreed and the year group for which the parents have requested a place is a current year group in the school, then the application will be considered by the School Standards Committee and the parents advised of the outcome.

If the request is agreed and the year group for which the parents have requested a place is for a future year group, i.e. Year 7 in September 2028, then the original application is withdrawn, and the parents must submit a fresh application for Year 7 2028 when applications open in the autumn term of 2027. Please note that parents only have the right to re-apply for a place. Where the School Standards Committee agrees to consider an application for Year 7 the following year, that application is considered alongside all other applications received and parents will be advised of the outcome of that application on national offer day. No place is reserved or held for the child in advance.

APPEALS

Parents who wish to appeal against the decision of the School Standards Committee to refuse their child a place in the school should make that appeal request in writing to the Chair of the School Standards Committee at the school address. Appeals will be heard by an independent panel.

Please note that parents do not have the right to appeal if their request for their children to be admitted to a class outside of their normal year group has been refused, but the School Standards Committee have offered a place in the normal age group instead.

FURTHER APPLICATIONS AND FURTHER APPEALS

Any parent can apply for a place for their child at any time outside of the normal admissions round. Parents do not have the right to a second appeal in respect of the same school for the same academic year unless, in exceptional circumstances, the School Standards Committee has accepted a second application from the

parent because of a significant and material change in the circumstances of the parent, child or school, but have still refused admission.

LATE APPLICATIONS

Late applications will be dealt with in accordance with the Local Authority's co-ordinated admissions scheme. This states that in exceptional circumstances applications submitted to Birmingham local authority after the final closing date, but before the date that Birmingham local authority forwards the applications to the appropriate admission authority for consideration, may be considered at the same time as those which were received by the final closing date. Discretion will be used when considering the individual circumstances. For example where:

- There were exceptional reasons which prevented the parent from applying by the closing date.
- A child and the parent have moved home.
- Where the parent has been contacted regarding the information contained within their application, for example, an incomplete application or potentially misleading information requiring further investigation.

All late applications received after the date that Birmingham local authority forwards the applications to the school to appropriate admission authority for consideration, but before the offer of places, will only be considered after those applications which were received on time have been considered. Such applications may therefore be less likely to be offered a place. All late applications received after the offer of places will be considered. In the event that St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School is undersubscribed, a place will be offered. Applications made on or after the start of the Autumn Term 2027 will need to be submitted directly to the school and will be treated as an in-year application.

You are encouraged to ensure that your application is received on time.

CHANGE IN PREFERENCE

Parents can submit changes of preferences from 1st September 2026 up until the closing date 31st October 2026 and the family's latest change in preferences up until the closing date will be the application that is processed. Any late changes of preferences received after 31st October 2026 no matter the family's circumstances, will not be processed until after the offer of places on 1st March 2027 (or the next working day). Parents in Birmingham are restricted to a maximum of six live preferences at a time, it is therefore important that parents visit www.birmingham.gov.uk/schooladmissions for further information of the implications of making late changes of preferences.

WAITING LIST

In addition to their right to appeal, children who have not been offered a place at St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School but were offered a school that was ranked as a lower preference on their application form will be added to a waiting list.

The waiting list will be maintained until the last day of the summer term 2028 and will then be discarded.

A child's position on a waiting list is not fixed. When a new child joins the waiting list, all applicants on that waiting list will be re-ranked to ensure that the list is always maintained in oversubscription criteria order. This means that a child's position on the waiting list could go up or down during the time that it is on the list. Any late applications accepted will be added to the waiting list in accordance with the oversubscription criteria.

Inclusion on the waiting list does not mean that a place will eventually become available. It may be that those already offered places may accept them, thereby filling all available places.

Children on the waiting list who attend a named feeder school (see Note 5 above) who have not been offered a place in the school by the beginning of the Autumn term 2027 will be re-ranked to take into account that they will no longer be attending that feeder school from 1st September 2027. This will affect the oversubscription criteria that your child is placed into on the waiting list from 1st September 2027.

Children who are the subject of a direction by the Local Authority to admit or who are allocated to a school in accordance with the Fair Access Protocol take precedence over those on a waiting list.

IN YEAR FAIR ACCESS PROTOCOL

The School Standards Committee of St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School is committed to taking its fair share of children who are vulnerable and/or hard to place, as set out in locally agreed protocols. Accordingly, outside the normal admission round the School Standards Committee is empowered to give absolute priority to a child where admission is requested under any locally agreed protocol. The School Standards Committee has this power, even when admitting the child would mean exceeding the published admission number.

APPLICATIONS OTHER THAN THE NORMAL INTAKE TO YEAR 7 (IN-YEAR ADMISSIONS)

An application can be made for a place for a child at any time outside the normal admission round and the child will be admitted where there are places available. Further information regarding instructions on how to apply for a place in the school at any other time other than the normal intake is available on the school's website at https://www.stacs.org/Admissions/.

To apply for a place at St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School in-year, parents will be required to complete Birmingham Local Authority's <u>In-Year Application Form</u> and return it directly to the school, ensuring that any required supplementary information is also attached.

If there are no places available, the child will be added to the waiting list (see above).

Parents will be advised of the outcome of their application in writing and, where the Board of Director's decision is to refuse their child a place, have the right to appeal to an independent appeal panel.

There is no charge or cost related to the admission of a child to this school.

ADMISSION TO THE SIXTH FORM

The school operates a sixth form for a total of 200 pupils. 105 places overall will be available in Year 12. Whilst the admission number is 20, if fewer than 85 of the school's existing pupils transfer into Year 12, additional external pupils will be admitted until Year 12 meets its capacity of 105.

Applications for the Sixth Form should be made directly to the school using the application form available from the school's website. Completed application forms must be returned to the school. Completed application forms must be returned to the school by 31st December 2026.

Both internal and external pupils wishing to enter the sixth form will be expected to have met the same minimum academic entry requirements for the sixth form. These are:

- AS courses a minimum of 5 GCSEs at grade 4 and above (usually to include Maths and English).
 Some courses may require a higher grade (see course details).
- Level 3 BTEC courses a minimum of 5 GCSEs at Grade 4 and above usually to include Maths and English).
- Level 2 BTEC 4 GCSEs grades 3 and above

In addition to the sixth form's minimum academic entry requirements pupils will need to satisfy minimum entrance requirements to the courses for which they are applying. If either internal or external applicants fail to meet the minimum course requirements they will be given the opportunity of pursuing any alternative courses for which they do meet the minimum academic requirements. Course requirements are published annually in the school's prospectus and on its website.

When Year 12 is undersubscribed, all applicants meeting the minimum academic entry requirements will be admitted or permitted to progress.

When there are more external applicants that satisfy any academic entry requirements priority will be given in accordance with the oversubscription criteria set out below.

Where there is space in Year 13, i.e. where there are fewer than 100 pupils in the year group, the school will admit additional pupils up to this number using the oversubscription criteria set out below.

Where there are more applications for places than the number of places available, places will be offered according to the following order of priority. If there is oversubscription within a category, the School Standards Committee will give priority firstly to children who will have a brother or sister (see Note 4 above) attending St. Thomas Aquinas Catholic School at the time of admission and then secondly to children living closest to the school determined by the shortest distance (see Note 6 above)

The admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care Plan is dealt with by a completely separate procedure. Children with an Education, Health and Care Plan that names the school must be admitted. Where this takes place before the allocation of places under these arrangements this will reduce the number of places available to other children.

- 5. Non-Catholic children of a member of staff working for St Thomas Aquinas Catholic School (see note 8 above).
- 6. Other Non-Catholic children.

APPENDIX

DEFINITION OF A "BAPTISED CATHOLIC"

A "Baptised Catholic" is one who:

Has been baptised into full communion (Cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church, 837) with the Catholic Church by the Rites of Baptism of one of the various ritual Churches in communion with the See of Rome. Written evidence of this baptism can be obtained by recourse to the Baptismal Registers of the church in which the baptism took place (Cf. Code of Canon Law, 877 & 878).

Or

Has been validly baptised in a separated ecclesial community and subsequently received into full
communion with the Catholic Church by the Rite of Reception of Baptised Christians into the Full
Communion of the Catholic Church. Written evidence of their baptism and reception into full
communion with the Catholic Church can be obtained by recourse to the Register of Receptions, or in
some cases, a sub-section of the Baptismal Registers of the church in which the Rite of Reception took
place (Cf. Rite of Christian Initiation, 399).

WRITTEN EVIDENCE OF BAPTISM

The Governing bodies of Catholic schools and Boards of Directors of Catholic Academies will require written evidence in the form of a Certificate of Baptism or Certificate of Reception before applications for school places can be considered for categories of "Baptised Catholics". A Certificate of Baptism or Reception is to include: the full name, date of birth, date of Baptism or Reception, and parent(s) name(s). The certificate must also show that it is copied from the records kept by the place of Baptism or Reception.

Those who would have difficulty obtaining written evidence of Catholic Baptism/Reception for a good reason, may still be considered as Baptised Catholics but only after they have been referred to their parish priest who, after consulting the Vicar General, will decide how the question of Baptism/Reception is to be resolved and how written evidence is to be produced in accordance with the law of the Church.

Those who would be considered to have good reason for not obtaining written evidence would include those who cannot contact the place of Baptism/Reception due to persecution or fear, the destruction of the church and the original records, or where Baptism/Reception was administered validly but not in the Parish church where records are kept.

Governors and Boards of Directors may request extra supporting evidence when the written documents that are produced do not clarify the fact that a person was baptised or received into the Catholic Church, (i.e. where the name and address of the Church is not on the certificate or where the name of the Church does not state whether it is a Catholic Church or not).

For the purposes of this policy, a looked after child (see Note 3) living with a family where at least one of the parents/carers is Catholic will be considered as Catholic.
