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Message from CIIr Brigid Jones and CIIr Tristan Chatfield

Writing to you after a terror attack is awful. Writing to you after an attack that targeted children and young people, just like you, is something we never thought we'd have to do. By the time you read this there will be more information out about who has been injured, killed and lost loved ones, but one thing we do know is that they will be ordinary people just like you and me, from a city just like ours.

Our job is to protect children and young people like you from harm in our city, to make sure you have the best time growing up, and to have great schools and opportunities for your futures. There are more than 400 head teachers, 800 social workers, 26,000 teachers and hundreds of police

officers and other workers here in our city who make it their lives work to help you give you those futures. Your parents, carers and families, as well, look out for you and look after you every day. It's just the same in Manchester, and all across Britain, from Derry to London, from Cornwall to Scotland; all over Britain we believe in giving you the best start in life.

The actual attack was carried out by one man. As we write this, we don't know yet why he decided to attack children and young people; but we know that, for him to do so, his values are the opposite of ours, and of all those thousands of people in the city who are rooting for you and working for you. Nothing we can do can bring the dead back. But we can stand up against him and what he wanted to achieve by making sure the dead are never forgotten, by sticking to our values, and by living to the full the lives that he thinks we shouldn't have.

However many people there are out there who don't want us to succeed, they will be tiny compared to the millions of us who believe in our values and believe in you, and are doing all we can to help you and protect you. Please take a moment today to think of the victims in Manchester, who are just like us, and make sure they're not forgotten. And please take a moment to think of all the millions of people who believe in British values and will carry on fighting to protect them, and you.

Statement from Cllr John Clancy, Cllr Robert Alden and Cllr Jon Hunt

A cross-party statement supporting the Lord Mayors and paying tribute to Manchester has been issued by the three Birmingham City Council Group Leaders:

Birmingham stands firm with our friends in Manchester today.

Our thoughts and our prayers are with the victims, their families and everyone affected by a barbaric act of terror.

This is a dark day but we know that our towns and cities will not be beaten by terror. People will respond as they did in Manchester last night with kindness, bravery and a resolve not to be cowed into submission.

The normal business of Full Council will continue here in Birmingham today and Cllr Anne Underwood will be installed as the city's new Lord Mayor. Understandably Cllr Underwood feels it would be inappropriate to continue with the planned civic dinner this evening and has decided to postpone the event. We fully support her decision. However we will re-schedule the event for a later date.

Today though we stand shoulder to shoulder with the people of Manchester.

Message to community groups from Waqar Ahmed MBE, Prevent Manager

The message below has been issued to community groups across Birmingham from Waqar Ahmed.

Dear Colleagues,

We woke up this morning to the devastating news of the attack in Manchester yesterday evening. It has been reported that 22 people have lost their lives and many more injured, we also understand that children are amongst those killed. Greater Manchester Police understand that the explosion to be the work of a lone attacker and hence once again our communities are victim to an act of terrorism. Of course, it goes without saying, that this is a time for prayer for those families who have lost loved ones and for unity between our communities standing together against terrorism in all its forms.

The Police have asked for communities not to speculate on the identity or motivation of the attacker as they undertake a very difficult and fast-moving investigation into the attack. West Midlands Police will be reviewing security around the City and we urge all to remain as we have been for a while extra vigilant and report anything suspicious. We will keep colleagues updated with any news as it unfolds.

Our thoughts and prayers are with the victims and their families.

Ofqual statement: advice for schools and students

Many students and teachers are likely to have been affected by the tragic events in Manchester last night. Head teachers are best placed to decide whether exams should go ahead as planned.

We will consider with the exam boards how the provisions that are normally made for students who are unable to sit their exams when planned, or who take their exams but whose performance might be affected, will be applied. Students and their parents should seek advice and information from their schools. Our thoughts are with everyone affected.
