Segmentation

This document is based on Experian Mosaic Public Sector Segmentation for Birmingham City Council (BCC) looking at household and service use. Each segment consists of two pages of information.

This segmentation does not include Segments A and G due to extremely low population counts in Birmingham.

The first page identifies:

- The percentage of Birmingham households and people in each segment.
- The top three wards that represent the segment.
- A map illustrating the percentage of Birmingham households in the segment, represented by ward (i.e. 10 - 12% of households in segment D can be found in each of the Sutton Coldfield wards).
- Key characteristics for each segment.
- Preferred communication channels.

The second page identifies:

• The council priorities and provides a description of how each segment relates to each priority.

- The proportion of total service users in the segment (based on service data 2014 2015).
- The rank of service area by segment: this shows how dependent the segment is on the service (with 1 having the highest proportion and therefore the highest usage and 13 having the smallest proportion and therefore having the lowest usage).
- The index score: this compares the proportion of the segment in the service/area against the proportion of the segment in Birmingham. A score of 100 = equal proportion to Birmingham, 200 = double the proportion of Birmingham, 50 = half the proportion of Birmingham.

For the index score, which is based on a comparison with Birmingham proportions, please note that some of the service data contains service users from outside Birmingham.



- Environmentally conscious









- May struggle financially if adult children living with them are unemployed









Least environmentally conscious group of all.
